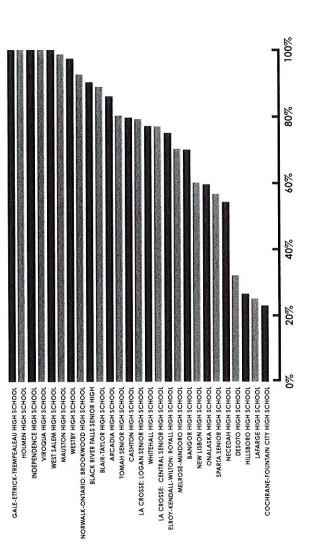

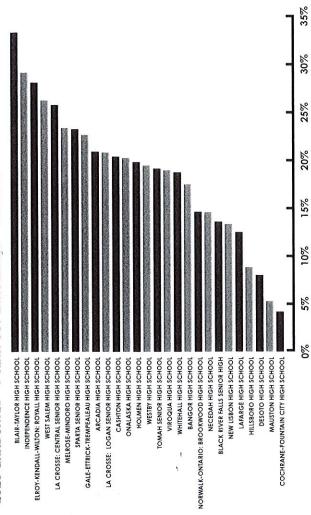

COMMUNITY SERVICE ACADEMIC & CAREER PLANNING

Policy 355

Students may earn community service hours in a variety of ways. These would include, but are not limited to, activities involving assistance to youth or personnel in the school district, volunteer work for non-profit organizations (recycling centers, nursing homes, hospitals, community or civic organizations, churches), summer youth activities, etc. The service <u>may not</u> result in money earned as payment for the student. The high school Youth Serving Youth Program will qualify with administrator approval.

Students must complete a Community Service Form for each project performed. This form is available in the Guidance Office. Each project should be pre-approved by the building administrator or a Guidance Counselor. Final approval of any project rests with the building administrator. Students must complete "follow-up" portion of the Community Service Form following the activity, including actual hours served and supervisor's signature. In the "follow-up" portion of the form, each student must briefly describe the benefits of his/her service to the community, as well as the benefits the student received personally. Completed forms must be turned in to the Guidance Office.

All Gale-Ettrick-Trempealeau High School students will be required to earn .5 credit of Community Service. This credit requirement will be satisfied with an approved project or projects totaling 60 hours. Upon completion of 60 approved hours, .5 credit will be placed on the high school student's transcript, and the Community Service Form(s) will be filed in the student's portfolio. This course will be pass/fail (not graded), but will count toward graduation requirements. Failure to complete this project will result in no diploma issued to the student. The Community Service credit requirement will be waived for students who transfer to the Gale-Ettrick-Trempealeau High School for their senior year.

Academic and Career Planning (ACP) is intended to equip students and their families with the tools necessary to make more informed choices about postsecondary education, training, careers for life after high school. It is part of DPI's overall vision for every student to graduate high school academically, socially, emotionally, and life ready.

All Gale-Ettrick-Trempealeau High School students will be required to earn 0.25 credits a year, for a total of 1.0 credits towards graduation. This credit requirement will be satisfied with students being enrolled in an ACP advisory class that will meet weekly throughout the school year. This course will be graded pass/fail (not graded) but will count toward graduation requirements. The activities, assignments, and experiences will provide a school-wide culture of support for student transition to adulthood. Failure to complete this course, including the community service, will result in no diploma being issued to the student. The ACP credit requirement may be waived or adjusted for students who transfer to the Gale-Ettrick-Trempealeau High School.

The middle school will promote, emphasize, and coordinate community service opportunities.

SUICIDE PREVENTION/INTERVENTION/POSTVENTION STUDENT SUICIDE PREVENTION AND INTERVENTION

Policy 457

The Board of Education of the Gale Ettrick Trempealeau School District recognizes that suicide is a major mental health and social problem in contemporary America, and is particularly acute for its youth. The Board also recognizes that suicide prevention, intervention and postvention is a community issue that necessitates coordination with public and private services available to the District and public education.

With these recognitions in mind, the District establishes the following plan of action.

- 1. <u>Prevention</u>: The establishment of faculty awareness on the warning signs of suicide and the establishment of suicidal prevention programming for students as an integral part of the curriculum. Specific goals are to:
 - a. Educate faculty to the dimensions of suicide and ways of recognizing and responding to suicidal students. The professional staff shall be informed annually of the suicide prevention resources available from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction as required by state law.
 - b. Help students identify and "normalize" feelings, provide general knowledge and assist students in identifying an appropriate system of response.
- 2. <u>Intervention</u>: The establishment of a uniform protocol by the District to respond to a potentially suicidal student. The goal is to insure more effective assessment and referral of potentially suicidal students to the appropriate agency. To achieve such an end, community agencies need to be identified, so that communication occurs effectively when the need is apparent.
 - Treat suicide attempt as Medical Emergency.
 - Take all threats seriously and report.
 - If person is an immediate threat; DO NOT LEAVE PERSON

Level I: Threat is a rumor or hearsay

- Immediate interview by a member of the Pupil Services Staff (i.e. nurse, school counselor, school psychologist)
- Consult with another member of Pupil Services for decision making as appropriate
- Report incident to Building Administrator
- Contact parent/guardian to discuss impressions, recommendations, and referral source as appropriate

Level II: Person is in need of psychological consultation within a reasonable amount of time.

- See above steps
- Call Social Services to report incident (715/538-2311 ext 290)
- Call 911 if necessary
- Request immediate involvement with parent/guardian
- Support parent/guardian in decision-making and/or documentation of counseling plan
- Inform the Building Administrator

Level III: Death/Suicide on school property

- * IMMEDIATELY REPORT INCIDENT TO BUILDING ADMINISTRATOR
- Assess situation for safety issues
- Notify office to call 911
- Secure area, remove and isolate witnesses with a staff member
- Secure scene and protect evidence, cooperate and facilitate investigations by the proper authorities
- Notify District Office
- Initiate Crisis Response Team by contacting Pupil Services Office
- File incident report; send copy to District Office
- 3. <u>Postvention</u>: The establishment of a uniform plan of response to disseminate facts, allow for structured expression of grieving within the daily activity of the school. The goal is to insure a factual, sensitive response, without glorifying the tragic event of suicide so that students can share and express, and work through their feelings in a structured environment. (See School-Based Crisis Response Plan)

Crisis Response Team

Recognizing that various crises or traumas may impact students and staff, the School District of Gale-Ettrick Trempealeau has identified the K-12 Guidance Counselors, School Psychologist, AODA Coordinator, and Pupil Service Coordinator as the G-E-T School District's Crisis Intervention Team that will provide leadership in dealing with these crises as they occur. This district team, in conjunction with appropriate building level administrators and staff, will respond to reported crises or trauma by developing and implementing a plan. The implementation of this plan will be facilitated and insured through checklists and forms. Inservice will be provided to all staff regarding these procedures. Records will be maintained of all crisis team response plans. These plans will be reviewed, and revisions in policy and procedures implemented as indicated by data collected.

Wis. Stat. 118.295 states: Any school board, private school, county children with disabilities education board or cooperative educational service agency, and any officer, employee or volunteer thereof, who in good faith attempt to prevent suicide by a pupil is immune from civil liability for his/her acts or omissions in respect to the suicide or attempted suicide. The civil liability immunity provided in this section is in addition to and not in lieu of that provided under s. 895.48(1).

With the goals of promoting students' well-being, intervening with students who may be identified as struggling or in crisis, reducing actual or attempted incidents of youth suicide and other forms of self-endangerment, and responding appropriately to any such incident that has a connection to the District, the School Board directs the administration to address youth suicide prevention and intervention through a multi-faceted approach that includes at least the following components:

- 1. Initiatives to increase staff awareness of issues related to youth suicide, including, at a minimum and as required under state law, providing annual notice to the District's licensed staff of the suicide prevention resources and services that are available through the Department of Public Instruction.
- 2. Additional periodic professional development opportunities for appropriate staff, as determined by the administration, that relate to youth suicide prevention and intervention. Such opportunities may be voluntary or required and may be provided internally or through external sources.
- 3. Age-appropriate instructional programming for students in the area of personal development that, as required under state law, is designed to address matters such as:
 - a. The promotion of students' positive social and emotional development;

- b. The promotion of positive psychological, emotional, and problem-solving responses among students;
- c. Skills that help students cope with social change; and
- d. At appropriate developmental levels, instruction that addresses the causes and signs of suicidal ideation/tendencies or other forms of self-harm, knowledge of the relationship between youth suicide and the use of alcohol and controlled substances, and knowledge of youth suicide prevention and intervention services that are available in the community.
- 4. The incorporation of services and resources that address student mental health needs, positive social and emotional development, and suicide prevention and intervention within the District's approach to providing guidance and counseling programs and services for students.
- 5. The incorporation of suicide intervention and response components within the District's crisis intervention and response procedures, including appropriate communication of such procedures to staff.
- 6. The identification of and, where feasible, the engagement of cooperative efforts with relevant agencies, community organizations, and other experts. This may include identifying qualified agencies or organizations that:
 - a. Offer consultative services to school professionals related to youth suicide prevention, intervention, and response; or
 - b. Serve as emergency and non-emergency points of contact for youth who may be experiencing a suicidal crisis or other form of emotional distress and/or for students or families who may have related concerns regarding themselves or others.

Assignment of Responsibility

The Pupil Services Director shall have primary administrative responsibility and accountability to the Board for overseeing and coordinating the District's approach to youth suicide prevention and intervention in a manner that is consistent with the above-identified general framework and the specific mandates found in state law.

State Civil Liability Exemption

The State of Wisconsin encourages attempts to intervene in and prevent youth suicide by providing that the School Board and any District officer, employee, or volunteer who in good faith attempts to prevent suicide by a student is immune from civil liability under state law for his or her acts or omissions in respect to the suicide or attempted suicide.

USE OF SCHOOL FACILITIES GUIDELINES

830-Rule

The Board of Education of the Gale-Ettrick-Trempealeau School District believes that our school facilities should be available for use by all members of our community. The District Administrator shall approve (or disapprove) requests for facility use, without prejudice or discrimination, based on the guidelines outlined below.

1. Application For Use

- A. All requests for the use of the building should be directed to the Activities Director. The Activities Director reserves the right to deny the use of the building to any organization or activity, which in his/her opinion would not be in the best interest of the school district. Acceptable uses are, but are not limited to, the following:
 - 1) recreational sports programs
 - 2) fitness programs
 - 3) community group meetings
 - 4) funeral of community member
- B. Non-school organization functions shall be limited to times when school is not in session and when school groups are not using the facilities. For example, weekends or after 5:00 p.m. on weekdays.
- C. Any person or group interested in school facility usage must complete an electronic facility request at least 7 days prior to the start of the activity, and no sooner than one year prior. Exceptions to this 7-day rule may be made at the discretion of the District Administrator.
- D. All expenses incurred for the use of the facilities shall be paid by the user in accordance with the fee schedule and notations in the electronic facility request. Any cost for damages are also the user's responsibility.
- E. The Board reserves the right to adjust or suspend the rate schedule when mitigating circumstances of individual applicants indicate such modification is in order.
- F. The District Administrator reserves the right to revoke a facilities use permit at any time, with proper justification.
- G. If any organization is scheduled to use the building and a school group needs it, permission previously granted to the non-school organization will be revoked.
- H. The Board reserves the right to request proof of insurance by the users.

2. Supervision

- A. Designated adult supervision must be provided at all times when school-aged children are using school buildings or facilities.
- B. Adults using school facilities who bring minor children with them to the activity are responsible for the supervision of those children.
- C. In the event of emergency situations such as fire, civil defense or other, the adult in charge shall direct all personnel at his/her discretion.
- D. A school custodian will be required at the renter's expense when a custodian is not on duty.

E. Depending on the activity, security personnel may be required at the renter's expense.

3. Custodial Staffing Guidelines

- A. Custodians will be present when facilities are being used for activities in order to:
 - respond to emergencies that arise.
 - open and close facilities.
 - maintain restrooms and common areas.
 - coordinate set-up and returning facilities to same condition.
 - secure facilities.
- B. Exemptions to custodial staffing will occur when:
 - the activity has limited participation (less than 25 people) and a district staff member is an active member of the organization (opening and closing may be required).
 - limited or confined space, such as a classroom, is being used, no more than 25 participants, and a district staff member is an active member of the organization.
 - a custodian is regularly scheduled.

4. Facilities And Equipment Use Rules

- A. Activities should cease at the scheduled time as stated on the electronic facility request
- B. Groups must confine their activities to the areas requested.
- C. The custodians will not open any rooms except those specifically approved on the facility request or by permission of the Building Administrator.
- D. Exterior doors must remain locked until the adult leader of the activity or committee in charge arrives.
- E. No decorations or scenery shall be put up, or pianos or other furniture moved, unless special permission has been granted.
- F. The use of any equipment which may damage the floor or building is prohibited.
- G. Wax or any special floor dressing shall not be used by any group using the gymnasium or auditorium.
- H. Permission to use candles or any open flame must be obtained from the Building Administrator.
- I. Conduct by facility users:
 - 1) Use of, or the sale of, alcohol, drugs, or other controlled substances will not be permitted on school grounds at any time or under any circumstances. Users who violate this rule shall run the risk of having applications for facilities usage denied, and face possible legal intervention.
 - 2) Smoking or use of smokeless tobacco will not be allowed on school property.
 - 3) Food and non-alcoholic beverages may be consumed only in specific areas, as approved by the Building Administrator.
 - 4) Nothing shall be sold, given, exhibited or displayed in school facilities without permission.
 - 5) When district gymnasiums are to be used for physical activities, only persons with approved rubber-soled shoes are allowed on the gym floors. Failure to comply with this stipulation could obligate the user to pay all costs incurred for returning the floor condition to its proper state.

5. Kitchen Regulation And Supervision

A. A qualified food service worker shall be on duty to the extent necessary to preserve the health, safety, and well-being of the facility user and school children. The qualified food service worker shall act as supervisor of the space or stand and its equipment and shall lend all possible assistance to the facility user.

- B. It is the responsibility of the group to clean the facilities and equipment used as instructed by the food service worker.
- C. Compensation paid to cooks or custodians will be at the rate their current contract dictates and as outlined in the approved Facility Request Form.

6. Fee Schedule

- A. Level 1 School Groups and Civic Users. Level 1 users will receive a 100% discount. School Groups are groups directly associated with and approved of by the District and are made up of only District students. Civic users are governmental and non-profit charitable entities who use the school for public meetings, voting, and as emergency shelters. Examples include: FFA, DECA, Drama Club, City of Galesville, or the Red Cross.
- B. Level 2 Program Partners. Level 2 users will receive a 75% discount. Program partners are non-profit civic, charitable, service, education, or governmental groups whose members are primarily composed of District residents and whose purpose and activities have a direct connection with District programs or its students and who are not charging participants for the event. Examples include: G-E-T Athletic Booster Club, G-E-T Girl Scouts, or youth sports made up solely of G-E-T School District residents.
 - a. A 100% discount will be given to Level 2 users for events with the following criteria:
 - i. Fewer than 25 participants are expected to attend,
 - ii. There is no charge to participants, and
 - iii. A custodian is already present.
 - b. Examples include: G-E-T Booster Club meetings, G-E-T Girl Scout meetings, or youth sports practices.
- C. Level 3 Community Users. Level 3 users will receive a 50% discount. Community users are non-profit civic, charitable, governmental or service group whose members are primarily residents and whose purpose and activities serve the greater good of the community and/or school district and who are not charging participants. Level 3 also includes other public schools and universities unless noted otherwise. Examples include: Galesville Lions Club or the Chambers of Commerce.
- D. Level 4 Private Users. Level 4 users will pay the full cost of facility use. Private users are individuals, groups or organizations who use the facility for personal use, financial gain or to further the interest of their group. These are for-profit groups who may or may not be associated with the school and who may or may not be charging participants. Examples include: businesses, individuals, or corporations.
- E. Individuals and groups who use the Ettrick Community Center for less than six hours and who are not making a profit, realizing a financial gain or exchanging money will receive a 100% discount.

7. Fee Schedule

Athletic Complex (bleachers and field): Includes field, bleachers, PA system, lights, one custodian for 4 hours (additional time is \$20 per hour), ticket booth, bathrooms, parking, benches, chains. The concession stand is not available unless approved separately (or group is given permission to bring in separate table to set up).

- Fee is \$1200 (with \$100 as a returnable deposit after the event).
- Another school or non-profit group (Level 3) using our complex would be charged \$600 (with \$100 as a returnable deposit after the event)

Turf field: If only the field is needed for a practice, the fee will be similar to the gym rental fee. Extended use by a group may be eligible for a discount as approved by administration.

PAC: Base is \$400 (with a \$100 returnable deposit after the event). Added workers and needs will be determined and added on. See 830.1 Exhibit – Performing Arts Center Fee Schedule.

No fee for parking lot use.

Classroom rental would be \$20. Level 4 pays \$20, Level 2 pays \$5 (with possible exemptions).

Gym, Kitchen, Cafeteria would be \$100. Level 4 pays \$100, Level 2 pays \$25 (with possible exemptions).

USE OF PERFORMING ART CENTER GUIDELINES

-Policy 830.1-Rule

The Board of Education of the Gale-Ettrick-Trempealeau School District believes that our Performing Arts Center (PAC) should be available for use by all members of our community. The District Administrator shall approve (or disapprove) requests for facility use, without prejudice or discrimination, based on the guidelines outlined below.

1. Application For Use

- A. All requests for the use of the building should be directed to the PAC House Manager. The PAC House Manager reserves the right to deny the use of the building to any organization or activity, which in his/her opinion would not be in the best interest of the school district. Acceptable uses are, but are not limited to, the following:
 - 1) community group meetings or performances
 - 2) regional college or university performances
 - 3) funeral of community member
- B. Non-school organization functions shall be limited to times when school is not in session and when school groups are not using the facilities. For example, weekends or after 5:00 p.m. on weekdays.
- C. Any person or group interested in school facility usage must complete an electronic facility request at least 7 days prior to the start of the activity, and no sooner than one year prior. Exceptions to this 7-day rule may be made at the discretion of the District Administrator.
- D. All expenses incurred for the use of the facilities shall be paid by the user in accordance with the fee schedule and notations in the electronic facility request. Any cost for damages are also the user's responsibility.
- E. The Board reserves the right to adjust or suspend the rate schedule when mitigating circumstances of individual applicants indicate such modification is in order.
- F. The District Administrator reserves the right to revoke a facilities use permit at any time, with proper justification.
- G. If any organization is scheduled to use the building and a school group needs it, permission previously granted to the non-school organization will be revoked.

2. Supervision

- A. The PAC House Manager is responsible for the supervision and overseeing the protection of the PAC. The PAC House Manager shall use sound judgement and authority exercising this responsibility.
- B. Designated adult supervision must be provided at all times when school-aged children are using the PAC.
- C. Adults using the PAC who bring minor children with them to the activity are responsible for the supervision of those children.

- D. In the event of emergency situations such as fire, civil defense or other, the adult in charge shall direct all personnel at his/her discretion.
- E. A school custodian will be required at the renter's expense when a custodian is not on duty.
- F. Depending on the activity, security personnel may be required at the renter's expense.

3. Custodial Staffing Guidelines

- A. Custodians will be present when the PAC is being used for activities in order to:
 - respond to emergencies that arise.
 - open and close facilities.
 - maintain restrooms and common areas.
 - coordinate set-up and returning facilities to same condition.
 - secure facilities.
- B. Exemptions to custodial staffing will occur when:
 - the activity has limited participation (less than 25 people) and a district staff member is an active member of the organization (opening and closing may be required).
 - limited or confined space, such as a classroom, is being used, no more than 25 participants, and a district staff member is an active member of the organization.

4. Performing Arts Center And Equipment Use Rules

- A. Activities should cease at the scheduled time as stated on the electronic facility request form.
- B. Groups must confine their activities to the areas requested.
- C. The custodians will not open any rooms except those specifically approved on the PAC request form.
- D. Exterior doors must remain locked until the adult leader of the activity or committee in charge arrives.
- E. The PAC House Manager must give prior approval to any group for installation of any decorations that require the use of nails, screws, bots, etc. Tape, wax or glue shall not be used on any drywall, block construction, walls or wood floors. Nothing shall be attached to curtains.
- F. The use of any equipment which may damage the floor or building is prohibited.
- G. No glitter shall be used inside the PAC theater.
- H. Permission to use candles or any open flame must be obtained from the PAC House Manager.
- I. Property of non-school groups or organizations may not be stored in the District facilities or premises without prior approval of the PAC House Manager. The District is not responsible for lost, stolen or damaged property stored in District facilities or on District premises
- J. Users will be responsible for any special set-up required. Special set-up that is performed by District personnel will be charged directly to the individual or group/organization using the facility.
- K. Refreshments/food may be served only in designated areas (as identified by the PAC House Manager)
- L. The PAC House Manager and/or Technical Director must be present at all times of occupancy (unless exempt by the PAC House Manager)
- M. Renter shall leave the facility as it was presented to them. Includes removal of decorations
- N. Conduct by facility users:
 - 1) Use of, or the sale of, alcohol, drugs, or other controlled substances will not be permitted on school grounds at any time or under any circumstances. Users who

- violate this rule shall run the risk of having applications for facilities usage denied, and face possible legal intervention.
- 2) Smoking or use of smokeless tobacco will not be allowed on school property.
- 3) Food and non-alcoholic beverages may be consumed only in specific areas, as approved by the Building Administrator.
- 4) Nothing shall be sold, given, exhibited or displayed in school facilities without permission.

5. Fee Schedule

- A. Level 1 School Groups and Civic Users. Level 1 users will receive a 100% discount. School Groups are groups directly associated with and approved of by the District and are made up of only District students. Level 3 also includes other public schools and universities unless noted otherwise. Examples include: Galesville Lions Club or the Chambers of Commerce.
- D. Level 4 Private Users. Level 4 users will pay the full cost of facility use. Private users are individuals, groups or organizations who use the facility for personal use, financial gain or to further the interest of their group. These are for-profit groups who may or may not be associated with the school and who may or may not be charging participants. Examples include: businesses, individuals, or corporations.
- E. GET PAC will secure a deposit of 50% of the estimated invoice amount, in advance, for all non-GET resident entities or organizations that are first time GET PAC users and reserves the right to secure a deposit of up to \$1,000 in advance for all users. Deposits will be applied to final invoice.
- F. All cancellations or changes must be made through the GET PAC House Manager at least three (3) business days prior to the scheduled usage or the user may be billed for the entire facility use fee or the actual costs incurred by the District. Facility users will, however, be invoiced for costs related to moving of furniture or equipment that was required for the activity or event.

LENDING OF DISTRICT OWNED EQUIPMENT

Policy 837

The Board of Education believes that District-owned equipment is a valuable resource, which may be loaned for community use under certain conditions, only provided that such use does not infringe on the original and necessary purpose of the equipment or interfere with the educational program of the District.

The user of District-owned equipment shall be fully liable for any damage or loss occurring to the equipment during the period of its use, and shall be responsible for its safe return or replacement.

School-owned equipment should not be used for personal projects.

Staff and community members may request to use school-owned equipment which will be reviewed for approval by the district administrator, the direct of support services business manager, or a designee. This person will also inspect equipment upon return. The district will only consider lending items that are not likely to break, are not dangerous, and do not have a value of over \$2000 unless exempted for special reason by the district administrator.
